MR. FRANK CUNDALL.

The "Daily Telegraph", London, in its issue of Nov. 16, published the following:

Mr. Frank Cundall, who for the past 46 years had been secretary and librarian to the Institute of Jamaica, died yesterday at Kingston Jamaica, aged 78.

He helped to organise great exhibitions before settling in Jamaica in 1891 and as an antiquarian and historian wrote voluminously. He had been a Fellow of the Royal Empire Society since 1895.

Twice married, Mr. Cundall is survived by one son and one daughter. His second wife died in 1931. His elder brother, Mr. Herbert Minton Cundall, was engaged at the Victoria and Albert Museum for 45 years and senior keeper from 1905 to 1910.

INSTITUTE OF JAMAICA

GREAT WORK WHICH WAS DONE BY THE LATE MR. FRANK CUNDALL.

Before the meeting of the Board of Governors of the Institute of Jamaica held Thursday—the first ordinary meeting to take place

since the death of Mr Frank Cundall—the chairman Mr. J. L. Pietersz, held a special meeting in tribute to the memory of Mr Cundall.

In the course of his address, the Chairman recalled that the members of the Board wished to place on record the official expression of their deep sense of loss at the death of the Secretary, and their appreciation and regard for the great work which Mr Cundall had done not only for the Institute, but for the whole island. Mr Cundall had been Secretary of the Institute for over forty-five years, and it was chiefly due to his indefatigable activity that the Institute had become the leading historical Centre in the British West Indies.

The Chairman further expressed the deep gratification of the Board at the numerous tributes which had been paid in the press abroad to Mr Cundall's activities in the field of historical research, as these showed that the world had not been unaware of the invaluable work which Mr Cundall had been doing, nor hesitant in expressing its appreciation.

Mr. Pietersz recalled the many publications which Mr Cundall had issued, and especially the volumes of his History of the Governors of Jamaica, two of which have already appeared; others are still in manuscript and it is hoped that the Institute will be in a position at some time to complete the series.

In conclusion, the Chairman referred to the magnificent West India Reference Library which had been Mr. Cundall's especial care and which will ever remain a lasting monument to his memory.

At the finish of this address the Board rose in silence as a token of its respect.
