## US college gets gift of books on W.I.

An impressive collection of books and periodicals about the West Indies has been presented to the Library of Olivet College, Michigan, USA by a student, Mr. Bruce Redner, in memory of the Rt. Excellent Norman Manley National Hero, A JIS release has said.

The head librarian at the college, Mrs. J. R. Gambardella has informed the Hon. Michael Manley, Prime Minister of Mr. Redner's gift. She said that the books and periodicals will be valued additions to the Library's collection.
