Shortly followed in early April last year another Royal State visit of His Imper-ial Majesty, Haile Selassie I. Emperor of Ethiozia, and the Commonwealth Games were played here in August last. Here again Sir Donald presided over these noble events with credit and ability. He fought against numerous odds in the greated elections.
