Sir Donald died in the Montreal Neurological Institute, in Canada, where he had been receiving medical attention since Tuesday, March 21, 1967. He was rushed there on a special plane. which was placed at his disposal by the Government of the United States, when his local doctors diagnosed that he was suffering ster, to go to Canada. from a sub-arachnoid haemorrhage.

This diagnosis was confirmed by the speciaists in the Montreal Neurological Institute.

Sir Donald fell ill while he was in Newcastle, in up-per St. Andrew, on Satur-day, March 18, 1967, while he was working on the de-ter's illness, arrangements ther examination.
