A team of ladies of the Church were responsible for the draperies as well as for hospitality and housing of the Military and Police Force who did a magnificent job in controlling and organising the vast crowds as they passed through the Church in an endless stream of humanity during the seven hours of vigil.

Tribute must be paid to Messrs. Bruce, Bennett, Rogers, and a number of others responsible for the preparation of the Church grounds and the erection of two arches of the national colours at the head of the two roads leading to the church. Also we thank the public officers responsible for making available needful washing facilities for those coming from far.

Help us all to be worthy of him, who, venturing all in obedience to Thy call, has gone forth to death with sure trust that in Thee he will rise to life again.
