Seaga trophy for Wolmer's

Prime Minister Edward Seaga has offered \$1,000 towards a trophy for a special competition for the students of the Wolmer's Boys' School.

Replying to a toast proposed by Mr. Don Brice, Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Tourism, at the dinner by the Wolmer's Old Boys' Association in his honour on Saturday night, Mr. Seaga said the money should be administered by the school and to be awarded to the boy who best bears out the motto of the school.

The function, attended by several

Wolmerians and their wives, was chaired by the Hon. Leacroft Robinson, President of the Court of Appeal, who is chairman of the school's Building and Development Fund Committee. It was held at the Intercontinental Hotel, in downtown Kingston.

Following the tribute to the Prime Minister, by Mr. Brice which traced the history of Mr. Seaga and himself at the school during the 1940s, Mr. Seaga was presented with a citation saluting him as "the first Prime Minister from Wolmer's" and naming some of his achieve-

ments before becoming Prime Minister.

Replying, Mr. Seaga said there was a long list of illustrious sons who came out of Wolmer's. One of whom was Mr. Hector Wynter, Editor of the Gleaner.

Mr. Brice in his speech also said that Wolmer's Boys' school could be justifiably proud "in producing a Governor-General and a Prime Minister of Jamaica at the same time.

The reference to the Governor-General was to Sir Florizel Glasspole, a former Wolmerian.
