The attributes of the patriot committed to the the development of a positive and accurate portrayal of the magnificent historical heritage of the Jamaican people, are embodied in the life of this articulate Jamaican.

His multi-faceted contribution to the growth of national awareness of the many epic struggles waged by the masses against exploitative social, economic and political relations in the past is expressed in his work as journalist and writer, cultural antropologist and

historian. Through the medium of the historical novel he pro-claimed to the world his con-viction of the legitimacy of the struggles of his countrymen in a way that led to the recognition inter-nationally of these struggles as outstanding examples of the triumph of the human

spirit over adversity.
"The Leopard", an account of Mau-Mau activities in Kenya as seen from an African perspective; "Mount Ephraim", set in the era of the Sam Sharpe Rebellion;

and "I he Jamaicans", a moving account of the Juan De Bolas story, defied the attempts of the European coloniers to assimilate our history to their perspectives for the purpose of maintaining pe vasive power.

Vie Reid's novels for chil-

dren l ave won wide accla m here and abroad and illus-trates his recognition of the reality that permanent attitudinal hange must begin in

earlies youth.

As Chairman of the National Turst Committee, he conceived and imple-mented the "Wayside Histor-ic Maker" programme and was the founder of the historical anchaeological "Museum of the Jamaican Man" at Port Royal - the first of its kind in the West Indies.

His contribution to the sum of national and international cultural heritage will be itself indelibly written

on the pages of history.
