Albert Huie at Harmony Hall

Harmony Hall's winter season reaches one of its high points on Sunday, January

29, at 12 noon, when the U.S. Ambassador William Hewitt will open an exhibition of new works by Albert Huie.

Born in Falmouth, in 1920, Albert Huie embarked on a career that was then unheard of. Despite the early problems, he persevered to become an artist of international

repute. In doing so, he helped to change the attitudes of a country, clearing the way for future generations of Jamaican artists.

Studies in Toronto and London refined his rare ability, and he now works from homes in Jamaica and New York.

A long and happy association with Jamaica Inn has made Ocho Rios al-

most a second home for Albert Huie, and this was a major factor in his selection of Harmony Hall as the location for his next one-man show. Many of the hotel's regular guests have expressed their desire to acquire a Huie. This exhibition will be their best opportunity to do so.
